Interim Artistic Director

ORIGINALLY FROM Baltimore, Maryland, Deborah Hirsch graduated from the University of Kansas with Bachelor degrees in Music Therapy and Music Education and earned a Master of Music degree at Texas A&M University-Commerce.



Ms. Hirsch retired after her 37th year as a band director in the Pasadena Independent School District where bands under her direction have performed and competed successfully at the Texas Renaissance Festival, Texas UIL Concert and Sight-re ading Contest, Solo and Ensemble Contest, and Region Band competitions. The band was selected 3 times to perform at the state capitol for Arts Education Day and has performed the national anthem for 22 consecutive years for the Houston Astros.

Ms. Hirsch was named "Teacher of the Year" in 2014 and is an active member of Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association and Texas Music Adjudicators Association. Jason is a graduate from Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas, where he received a Bachelor's of Music in 2003. He studied Conducting with Travis Almany and Dr. Barry Johnson and has additional conducting instruction from Craig



Kirchoff, Professor of Conducting at the University of Minnesota (retired). After moving to Houston in 2004, Jason joined the Houston Pride Band as a bassoonist in 2005. He was named Interim Artistic Director in early 2006 and appointed Artistic Director in November of 2006. After six years leading the Houston Pride Band, he stepped down to be Assistant Director in 2011 and joined the percussion section. Jason re-assumed the role of Artistic Director in Spring 2014 until new directors were chosen at the end of the 2015 season. He has again resumed an Artistic Director role in 2016 until a new Artistic Director is chosen for the group and also serves on the Board of Directors.

Jason has been a guest conductor for the Oak Lawn Symphonic Band in Dallas, Texas and for Gay Games VIII in Cologne, Germany. He currently works for the Houston Public Library as manager for System Services and as music librarian for the River Oaks Chamber Orchestra, a professional chamber orchestra in Houston, Texas. In addition to performing with the Houston Pride Band, Jason is 2nd bassoonist with the Houston Civic Symphony, and also plays with and serves on the Board of Directors for the Hurricanes Flag Football League of Houston, Houston's gay flag football league.

Dance Performer

Karen Freedman is a native Houstonian. She began social ballroom dancing twenty years ago with her husband, Buster, in a Ballroom dance class at the Jewish Community Center with Johnny Tanon. Her new-found passion for dancing, motivated her to begin training for numerous community exhibitions. She has competed at the



2012 Texas Challenge, winning first place in both of her entries. She has entertained at many charity events including many parties at the Jewish Community Center, Seven Acres Jewish Senior Care Services, Melody Lane Dance Club, the United States Amateur Ballroom Dance Association, YMCA and National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW) Gala events.

Karen has been actively volunteering in the Houston

community for over 30 years. She has served on the board of many organizations, but her primary focus has been helping victims of domestic violence and abused and neglected children. Johnny Tanon

Dance Performer

JOHNNY TANON has been a Ballroom dance teacher and choreographer for over 45 years. He created a teaching method to simplify learning that helped his students win at National competitions, helped him win top teacher awards, and helped him become a dance director in charge of training and coaching other teachers.

As a dancer, he and wife Elizabeth, who he trained, have performed in plays, television, hotels, clubs, conventions and private parties. In 1990, they were featured on the front page of Zest magazine. After he retired from the rigors of daily technical and competitive teaching, they continued to perform at private functions.

For the past 28 years, Johnny has taught at the Jewish Community Center where he has helped hundreds of couples, including many wedding couples, to shine at their first dance and all their social dance activities. Since 2001 he has performed with Karen Freedman, his student, at numerous community exhibitions including tonight's show. In 2012, they also won first place at both their entries at a National dance competition.

program notes

Dancing Queen

By Benny Andersson, Björn Ulvæus & Stig Anderson, Arr. by Jerry Brubaker

CELEBRATING 40 YEARS since its August 1976 release, Dancing Queen was the lead single from ABBA's fourth studio album, "Arrival". A worldwide hit, it became ABBA's only number one hit in the United States. As disco music dominated the US charts, the group decided to follow the trend, replicating the ubiquitous disco "Wall of Sound." It has become a standard for dance divas like Carol Douglas and Kylie Minogue, and has been covered numerous times by acts including the Sex Pistols, the A*Teens, and U2. Since the track's release, it has been adopted by the LGBT community, and remains one of the most ubiquitous gay anthems.

Capriol Suite

By Peter Warlock, Arr. by Robert Longfield

THE CAPRIOL SUITE is a set of six dances composed in October 1926 by Peter Warlock and is considered one of his most popular works. Originally written for piano duet, Warlock later scored it for both string and full orchestras. According to the composer, it was based on tunes in Thoinot Arbeau's Orchésographie, a manual of Renaissance dances. Nevertheless, Warlock's biographer, Cecil Gray, said that "if one compares these tunes with what the composer has made of them, it will be seen that to all intents and purposes, it can be regarded as an original work." The work is dedicated to the Breton Composer Paul Ladmirault. This concert band version is arranged by Robert Longfield and the band is presenting two of the six original movements.

Theme from Emperor Waltz

By Johann Strauss, Arr. by Stuart Johnson

AISER-WALZER, OP. 437 (EMPEROR WALTZ) is a waltz composed by Johann Strauss II in 1889. The waltz was originally titled Hand in Hand and was intended as a toast made in August of that year by Austrian emperor Franz Josef on the occasion of his visit to the German Kaiser Wilhelm II where it was symbolic as a 'toast of friendship' extended by Austria to Germany. Strauss' publisher, Fritz Simrock, suggested the title Kaiser-Walzer since the title could allude to either monarch, and thus satisfy the vanity of both rulers. The waltz was first performed in Berlin on 21 October 1889. The original cover of the piano edition bore the illustration of the Austrian Imperial Crown.

A quiet march starts the waltz's introduction before a sweeping crescendo heralds the gentle principal melody of the first waltz. As more waltz sections are introduced, the mood remains constantly upbeat and triumphant. A fanfare ushers the end of the work, complete with a drumroll on the timpani and a strong brass flourish.

"Danse Bacchanale" from Samson and Delilah

By Camille Saint-Saëns, Arr. by Jay Bocook

This work comes from Camille Saint-Saëns' (1835-1921) only operatic success, Samson and Delilah. Composed between 1867 and 1876, the Bacchanale is an exciting instrumental ballet sequence from the third act of the opera. The Bacchanale falls in the midst of pagan ceremonies at the Philistines' Temple of Dagon, the same building Samson topples at the close of the opera. Saint-Saens evokes an atmosphere of exotic, near eastern ritual, utilizing melodies of augmented seconds and ethnic percussion to bring the work to a frenzied close. The opera had its first performance in Germany on December 2, 1877. This version is written by prolific composer/arranger Jay Bocook, former director of bands at Furman University.

Begin the Beguine

By Cole Porter, Arr. by William Teague

CO EGIN THE BEGUINE" is a popular song by Cole **D**Porter. He composed the song between Kalabahi, Indonesia, and the island of Fiji during a 1935 Pacific cruise aboard Cunard's ocean liner HMS Franconia. In October 1935, it was introduced by June Knight in the Broadway musical Jubilee, produced at the Imperial Theatre in New York City. A Beguine was originally a Christian lay woman of the 13th or 14th century living in a religious community without formal vows, but in the creole of the Caribbean, it was applied to a style of music and a slow, close couple's dance. The recording became one of the most famous and popular anthems of the entire Swing Era. MGM released the musical film Broadway Melody of 1940, in which Fred Astaire and Eleanor Powell danced to "Begin the Beguine". In short order, all the major big bands recorded it, including Harry James,

Benny Goodman, Tommy Dorsey and Glenn Miller, often as an instrumental, as in the film. As a vocal song, it also became a pop standard, beginning with Porter and Tony Martin; new interpretations are often still measured against renditions by Frank Sinatra and Ella Fitzgerald, and Elvis Presley did an adaptation of his own.

A Little Tango Music

By Adam Gorb

A DAM GORB is Professor and Head of the School of Composition at the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester, UK. He has a PhD in Composition from the University of Birmingham and has taught at universities in the USA, Canada, Japan and many European countries. Of this piece, the composer succinctly sums up his work: "This is a short sequence of melodies inspired by the curvaceous, melancholic and dangerous dance from Argentina that is the tango."

In the Mood

By Joe Garland, Arr. by Andy Clark

TN THE MOOD" is a popular big band-era #1 hit ▲recorded by American bandleader Glenn Miller. It topped the charts for 13 straight weeks in 1940 in the U.S. and one year later was featured in the movie Sun Valley Serenade. "In the Mood" opens with a now-famous sax section theme; trumpets and trombones add accent riffs. "In the Mood" was an arrangement by Joe Garland based on a pre-existing melody. Lyrics were added by Andy Razaf. The main theme, featuring repeated arpeggios rhythmically displaced, previously appeared under the title of "Tar Paper Stomp" credited to jazz trumpeter and bandleader Wingy Manone. The first recording of Joe Garland's version of "In the Mood" was made by Edgar Hayes and his Orchestra in 1938, with Garland participating, released as a B side to their recording of "Stardust" on Decca Records. The tune was finally sold in 1939 to Glenn Miller, who played around with its arrangement for a while. Glenn Miller's "In the Mood" became the all-time best-selling swing instrumental. The Glenn Miller 1939 recording was inducted into the Grammy Hall of Fame in 1983. It is one of the most recognized and popular instrumentals of the 20th century.

Can-Can You Name These Tunes?

Arr. by Jerry Williams

T's TIME FOR OUR OWN version of "Name That Tune!" Recognized band composer Jerry Williams created this special piece as a fun challenge for the listener. You won't believe how many classical and popular tunes he combined into this fun medley. Grab a pen and paper to see if you can name them all. We'll give you the first one: the Can-Can by Jacques Offenbach (from *Orpheus in the Underworld*).

Slavonic Dance No. 8

By Antonín Dvořák, Arr. by Robert Longfield

NTONÍN DVOŘÁK (1841-1904) was one of the **T**European composers of the latter half of the nineteenth century who were known as Nationalist composers, since they used musical idioms that would immediately be identified as having been written by a composer from that country. The native "country" of the composer Dvořák was not, during his lifetime an independent country at all, but was part of the larger Austro-Hungarian empire, known today as the Czech Republic. There are two sets of dances, which Dvořák would eventually call "Slavonic," rather than "Czech." This work is from the first set, written in 1878, containing eight dances, including two furiants, a polka, two sousedkas (waltzes), two skocnas (leap dances, one of which is the source of this arrangement) and a slow Serbian folk dance. The dance used as the source of this arrangement is the final dance of the set, in G Minor, and has a tempo marking of Presto, typical of the more vigorous of the folk dances of Eastern Europe. Even today, Czechs consider Dvořák's two sets of Slavonic Dances to represent some of the best examples of Czechoslovakian music in the orchestral repertoire.

Can I Have This Dance?

By Adam Anders and Nikki Hassman, Arr. by Michael Brown

During the first decade of this century, the Disney Channel introduced musical theatre to a new generation with the television movie musicals *High School*

Musical and High School Musical 2. The third installment, High School Musical 3: Senior Year was a major motion picture grossing over \$252 million and selling over 3.5 million copies of its soundtrack. This piece is a lush band arrangement of the waltz duet entitled "Can I Have this Dance?" sung in the film by Vanessa Hudgens and Zac Efron. The music review from AllMusic comments on the soundtrack saying, "Lost in the shuffle of the evergrowing High School Musical phenomenon is that the tween-sensation is actually a musical. Which means that despite its pop trappings, the soundtrack consists of full-blown show tunes that serve the story and helps make the movies work beautifully."

Copacabana

By Barry Manilow, Arr. by Johan de Meij

TNSPIRED BY A CONVERSATION between Barry Manilow **▲**and Bruce Sussman at the Copacabana Hotel in Rio de Janeiro, this song's lyrics refer to the Copacabana nightclub, "the hottest spot north of Havana." The story starts in the late 1940s, focused on Lola, a Copacabana showgirl, and her lover Tony, a bartender at the club. One night, a mobster named Rico takes an interest in Lola, but he overplays his hand while trying to seduce her and is attacked by Tony. The ensuing fight results in a shooting, and though it is initially unclear "who shot who," it soon becomes clear that Tony has died. Thirty years later, the club has been transformed into a discotheque, but a crazed and drunken Lola, having lost Tony, still spends her nights at the Copacabana dressed in her 1940s finery. The recording was used as incidental music in the 1978 movie Foul Play, which starred Chevy Chase and Goldie Hawn, and has been featured in over a dozen other films since. "Copacabana" debuted on Billboard magazine's Top 40 chart on July 7, 1978, and peaked at #8. The track was Manilow's first gold single for a song he recorded and released. Additionally, the lyrics to "Copacabana" earned Manilow his first and only Grammy Award for Pop Male Vocalist in February 1979. The arranger of this band version is famed Dutch composer and conductor Johan de Meij, whose Symphony No. 1 "The Lord of the Rings" was performed by the Houston Pride Band in 2015.

Danzón No. 2

By Arturo Márquez, Trans. by Oliver Nickel

TOMMISSIONED BY the National Autonomous JUniversity of Mexico in 1994, Danzón No. 2 is an orchestral composition by Mexican composer Arturo Márquez, inspired by a visit to a Veracruz ballroom. It is one of the most popular and most frequently performed Mexican contemporary classical compositions. It is a staple of the contemporary Mexican music literature and reflects on the dance style named danzón, which has its origins in Cuba but is a very important part of the folklore of the Mexican state of Veracruz. Danzón No. 2 gained great popularity worldwide when the Simón Bolívar Youth Orchestra of Venezuela under Gustavo Dudamel included it on their program for their 2007 European and American tour. Composed for full orchestra, the original piece features solos for clarinet, oboe, piano, violin, trumpet, and piccolo. The piece has also gained an important spot in the modern concert band literature through Oliver Nickel's transcription. The rhythmic interest in the piece is maintained through the use of varying accents and tempos.

Jump, Jive an' Wail

By Louis Prima, Arr. by Johnnie Vinson

songwriter/trumpeter Louis Prima. It first appeared on his album *The Wildest!* and became one of his signature songs. The song had a resurgence in popularity during the Swing revival in the late 1990s. The Brian Setzer Orchestra covered the song on their 1998 album *The Dirty Boogie* and won the Grammy Award for Best Pop Performance by a Duo or Group with Vocals at the 41st annual Grammy Awards. Prima is probably best known for his role in Disney's *The Jungle Book* where he portrayed the raucous orangutan King Louie, including singing the song "I Wanna Be Like You".

"Western One Step" from Suite of Old American Dances

By Robert Russell Bennett, Ed. by Edward Higgins

Robert Russell Bennett was a prolific composer, producing symphonies, chamber works, and concertos as well as his music for concert band. He is perhaps best known as orchestrator and arranger for Broadway shows and films, including *Porgy and Bess, The Sound of Music, Show Boat, Camelot,* and numerous others. His *Suite of Old American Dances* is a collection of familiar dance tunes. The Western One-Step is a variation of an early ballroom dance that was a precursor to the foxtrot. Other movements from the suite including "Cakewalk", "Schottische", "Wallflower Waltz", and "Rag".

An Afternoon at the Ballet

Arr. by John O'Reilly

A LREADY KNOWN for his compositions An Evening at the Symphony and A Night at the Opera, John O'Reilly, created this medley by weaving together the ballet themes from The Nutcracker and Swan Lake by Tchaikovsky, and La Gioconda (Dance of the Hours) by Ponchielli. Today's featured performance was choreographed by Roxanne Damone Curtis.

(I've Had) The Time of My Life

By Franke Previte, John DeNicola, and Donald Markowitz, Arr. by Mike Story

Time of My Life" was recorded by Bill Medley and Jennifer Warnes, and used as the theme song for the 1987 film Dirty Dancing. The song reached the top of the Billboard Top 100 and won numerous of awards, including an Academy Award for "Best Original Song", a Golden Globe Award for "Best Original Song" from Golden Globe, and a Grammy Award for Best Pop Performance by a Duo or Group with Vocals. The music was written by John DeNicola and Don Markowitz, with Previte as the lyricist. It was the lead single on the movie's soundtrack, which sold over 32 million copies, making it one of the best-selling albums of all time.
