DEBORAH HIRSCH

Artistic Director

Now in her 7th season with the Houston Pride Band, Deborah Hirsch is originally from Baltimore, Maryland. She graduated from the University of Kansas with a bachelor's degree in music therapy and music education and earned a master's degree in music at Texas A&M University-Commerce. She also served in the 312th Army Band in Lawrence, Kansas before moving to Texas.

Retiring after 37 years as a band director in Pasadena, Texas, Deborah enjoyed a successful career in public education. Ms. Hirsch was named "Teacher of the Year" in 2014.

As a participant the Colorado University Conducting Symposium in June 2016 Ms. Hirsch studied under Steve Davis, Dr. Donald McKinney, Dr. Matt Roeder and Dr. Matthew Dockendorf. In June 2019, she attended the Conn-Selmer Institute where she was able to study, consult and collaborate with many of her band idols—Dr. Tim

Lautzenheiser, Dr. Paula A. Crider, Frank Troyka, Michael Sweeney and Richard Saucedo. In the 2019, Deborah was honored to direct the Association of Private Lutheran Schools Honor Band and the Texas Region 19 Class CC Band. In November 2021, she was the guest clinician for the Texas Region 19 CCC Band and shared the podium at the Bigger and Brighter Conference of the Pride Bands Alliance.

Deborah is an active clinician, judge, and consultant across the state and is a member of Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, Women Band Directors International, and Texas Music Adjudicators Association.

Ms. Hirsch is also a member of the chancel choir and bell choir at Bering Memorial United Church of Christ and a long time member of Pasadena Little Theater.

DAVID LEA Artistic Director

David Lea has been an Artistic Director for the Houston Pride Band since 2018. He joined the ensemble in 2016 and has previously served as trumpet section leader. When he's not conducting, he continues to play in the trumpet section and is a founding member of Brass Tax, a HPB brass quintet.

David earned bachelor's degrees from Texas A&M and Michigan State University in Psychology and Music Education, respectively. He earned his Master of Music Education from the University of North Texas. He has performed and participated in conducting symposiums with Drs. Kevin Sedatole and Craig Kirchoff, Dr. Matthew Westage, Michael Votta and Frank Battisti.

David is currently the Director of Bands at Michael R. Null Middle School in Northeast Houston. His bands have enjoyed successes at UIL Concert & Sight-Reading

Evaluations, and local and regional festivals. As a private trumpet teacher, his students have made Michigan All-state, earned first divisions at regional and state solo & ensemble contests, and had the honor of participating in the Michigan Youth Arts Festival. His professional memberships include Texas Music Educators and Texas Bandmasters Associations. David is an outspoken advocate for his LGBT+ students and was honored to support them by serving as the founding faculty advisor for a student organization focused on inclusion, acceptance, and community.



LA BELLE HÉLÈNE OVERTURE

La Belle Hélène (The Fair Helen) is the overture to a satirical operetta written as a spoof on the Greek myth of Helen of Troy. The plot centers around the rivalry between Paris and Hèléne's husband Menelaus for her favor. Paris's pursuit of Hèléne and her infidelity with him result in her falling in love with Paris, and Menelaus's throwing himself into the sea in a suicide attempt. He is rescued, however, and subsequently joins the army to fight the Trojan war. The first performance was given in Paris in 1864 at the Théâtre des Variétés. The Overture to La Belle Hélène is one of the favorites in modern orchestral programming from the pen of Jacques Offenbach (1819-1880). His numerous operettas that combined political and cultural satire with witty grand opera parodies were extremely popular in the 1850s and 1860. The great chef Auguste Escoffier is said to have created the fruit dessert "Pear Hélène" in honor of Offenbach and his work.

SONG FOR MOTHER GAIA

From the composer:

While perusing for a set of poems, I stumbled upon "June Night" by Sara Teasdale. Like most of Sara's poetry, this poem has a solemnity to it. Immediately, upon reading her poetry, three words came to mind: solitude, sincerity, and love. I adapted the poem into the following text:

Oh, Earth you are too dear tonight, How can I sleep, while all around Floats rainy fragrance and the far Deep voice of the ocean that talks to the ground?

Oh Earth, you gave me all I have, I love you, Earth.

This adapted text resulted in Song for Mother Gaia, which is just that – a song for Earth, showcasing my love for our beautiful planet. I have always loved nature, and part of that love, I believe, comes from the fact that some form of it has always surrounded me. This composition explores many different colors that mimic a beautiful transient moment of daydreaming, appreciating the wonders and beauty of what I call this huge green planet, home.

...AND KISSES ARE A BETTER FATE THAN WISDOM

From the composer:

...and kisses are a better fate than wisdom was written for the Houston Pride Band inspired by the poem [since feeling is first] by E.E. Cummings. This piece was meant to fit into the theme of "Summer Love" and the poem [since feeling is first] is the first thing that popped into my mind. E.E. Cummings happens to be one of my favorite poets and is most well-known for his love poems, which is why I felt it so fitting to base this composition on one of his works. This poem, in my view, is about loving without reason and regret; putting forward the idea that feeling is most important. I find this poem to be quite profound, and while most likely not the intention of the poet, I feel as though this poem is a beautiful representation of the LGBTQ experience, as there is only life and death, and we should love how we feel we should love. The title and movement titles are direct quotes from the poem that goes as follows.

since feeling is first who pays any attention to the syntax of things will never wholly kiss you;

wholly to be a fool while Spring is in the world

my blood approves, and kisses are a better fate than wisdom lady i swear by all flowers. Don't cry —the best gesture of my brain is less than your eyelids' flutter which says

we are for each other: then laugh, leaning back in my arms for life's not a paragraph

And death i think is no parenthesis

In the midst of writing this piece an unexpected inspiration presented itself and became influential in the overall scope of the composition. About a week into putting pen to paper, episode 3 of the television show *The Last of Us* aired. A show set in what is essentially a zombie apocalypse, dropped an episode that revolved around the beautiful relationship between two gay characters. It was an emotional rollercoaster of an episode that became the main inspiration of the second movement, which I wanted to feel completely and absolutely bittersweet.

THE BASSES ARE LOADED

John Philip Sousa wrote his *The National Game* march in 1925, using the sound of a baseball being struck by a bat. This march is a play on words that directly involves the national past-time. The wordplay alludes to the fact that the melody is found so often in the lower instruments of the band, particularly the tubas; truly *The Basses* are Loaded. The march is original, contemporary, and exhilarating. The composer Kelly Bennette taught for 29 years in the Texas public schools, most recently in Gilmore. He is principal tubist with the East Texas Symphonic Band and spent six years with the Lamar University Faculty Brass Quintet.

TANGO CORAZÓN

Cleverly blending the tango styles of Finland and Argentina, Tango Corazón is a concerto for trombone solo with wind band accompaniment. The solo trombone, performed tonight by Noel Freeman, sings over dance grooves in the percussion and wind section features. The composter, Hanna-Mari Lehtonen is a Finnish conductor, music educator, composer, and producer. She has Master's degree in music and Bachelor's Degree both in music pedagogics and in arts, entertainment, and media management.

THE BEATLES: LOVE

Based on the music of the phenomenal British rock band, famed music producer George Martin created The Beatles: Love for the ambitious Cirque du Soleil Las Vegas show. The show's soundtrack utilizes original Beatles recordings recast in new and imaginative settings and mixes. This adaptation of the Cirque du Soleil stage show was created for concert band, featuring a medley of "Because", "Drive My Car", "The Word"; "Eleanor Rigby", "Hey Jude", and "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band".

LOVED, NEVER ALONE

From the composer:

We live in such a diverse world. Sometimes we're raised to fear what we might not know or fully understand. "Loved, Never Alone" was written as a reminder to parents to lead with love, always. Parents should be loving champions for their child, honoring their identity and being a supportive guide during developing relationships. As parents, we can empathize with how challenging it can be for our child in a world that does not always welcome intimate bonds with someone of a different race, sexuality or identity. This composition is the journey of a child and their parent as they navigate some of young life's greatest choices and challenges. Each section of this work is intended to provoke emotions within child and parent as they each figure out who they can be. The work concludes with the strength of the child knowing their parent will always be

there, not in spite of who they choose to be or be with, but in celebration of - loved, and never alone!

THE BEACH BOYS GREATEST HITS

The Beach Boys were one of the most influential bands of the 1960s with their own distinct and innovative surf music sound that's still popular today. This medley of tuneful hits includes "California Girls", "Good Vibrations", "Surfer Girl", "Wouldn't It Be Nice", and "I Get Around".

SUMMERTIME

Summertime is an aria composed in 1934 by George Gershwin (1898-1937) for the 1935 opera *Porgy and Bess*. The lyrics are by DuBose Heyward, the author of the novel Porgy on which the opera was based. The song soon became a popular and much recorded jazz standard, described as "without doubt...one of the finest songs the composer ever wrote." Composer and lyricist Stephen Sondheim has characterized Heyward's lyrics for Summertime and My Man's Gone Now as "the best lyrics in the musical theater". The song is recognized as one of the most covered songs in the history of recorded music, with more than 33,000 covers by groups and solo performers.

SEASONS OF LOVE

"Seasons of Love" is a song from the 1996 Broadway musical Rent, written and composed by Jonathan Larson. The song traditionally starts with an ostinato piano motif, which provides the harmonic framework for the cast to sing "Five hundred twenty-five thousand, six hundred minutes" (the number of minutes in a common year). The song is performed by the entire cast to open the second act. The lyrics ask what the proper way is to quantify the value of a year in human life, concluding in the chorus that the most effective means is to "measure in love".

GREASE!

This medley includes selection from Grease, the 1971 musical by Jim Jacobs and Warren Casey. Named after the 1950s United States working-class youth subculture known as greasers, the musical is set in 1959 at fictional Rydell High School and follows ten working-class teenagers as they navigate the complexities of peer pressure, politics, personal core values, and love. This arrangement by John Moss includes "We Go Together", "Summer Nights", "Born to Hand Jive", "Beauty School Dropout", and "Greased Lightnin".

2023 Composition Competition

Last November, Houston Pride Band announced an open call for proposals, seeking a new composition that would capture the essence of "Summer Love," and written for our ensemble. The response was overwhelming, with numerous submissions pouring in from talented composers globally. From this pool of remarkable proposals, Houston Pride Band is thrilled to unveil the winning composition by Alec Schantz: "...and kisses are a better fate than wisdom." Crafted with creativity, passion, and musical brilliance, this exceptional piece emerged from a young composer deserving of the prestigious first prize in the competition. "Loved, Never Alone" by Joseph Benjamin Earp is another outstanding composition that emerged from this search, representing the depth and variety of talent showcased in the submitted proposals. We are honored to premiere it for you on this concert!

Houston Pride Band would like to extend its sincerest gratitude to all the composers who submitted their proposals for the new wind band piece. Their dedication to the craft of composition and their commitment to capturing the spirit of "Summer Love" have made this event even more special.

ALEC SCHANTZ

Alec Schantz is an educator, clarinetist, and composer from Northern California. Alec started their compositional career by arranging for the saxophone quintet Take Five. Eventually they wrote their first band piece, which premiered at their Senior Recital in 2017. They continued to write chamber music with a focus on clarinet, premiering works such as "Exhale" for clarinet quartet at their Junior Recital in 2020, "Zacramento Soo" for clarinet duet at their Senior Recital in 2021, and "Scaredy Cat" for clarinet nonet, also at their Senior Recital. Alec also had two band pieces titled "Where DOES the Sidewalk End?" and "I Wish I Could Give You Something", both premiered by the Chico

High Band in the spring of 2022.

As an educator, Alec began their career early. Toward the end of their high school career, Alec was giving lessons and taking part in a student internship at Egling Middle School where they got firsthand experience teaching in a K-12 setting. As a university student, Alec had the pleasure of working at Cazadero Music Camp as a woodwinds coach for students of Overfelt High School. Recently, Alec has finished up their student teaching at Chico High School where they taught and co-taught Jazz Band, Concert Band, Symphonic Band, Marching Band, and a guitar class, and now looks to pursue a masters degree in composition.

JOSEPH BENJAMIN EARP

Joseph Benjamin Earp is the Director of Bands at Hinds Community College in Raymond, Mississippi. He received his undergraduate degree in Music Education from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, Master of Music in Music Education from Anderson University (Anderson, South Carolina), and Doctor of Music Education degree from Liberty University (Lynchburg, Virginia).

In addition to teaching, Dr. Earp is an active published composer and clinician with his music being performed internationally. His major compositional accomplishments include being winner of the 2010 Claude T. Smith Composition Contest in Missouri, winner of the 2018

Thornton Community Band Composition Contest in Colorado, and multiple J.W. Pepper Editors' Choice awards. He currently resides in Clinton, Mississippi with his wife Mary Beth and sons Jackson and Jasper.

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
