riginally from Baltimore, Maryland, Deborah Hirsch graduated from the University of Kansas with a bachelor's degree in music therapy and music education and earned a master's degree in music at Texas A&M University-Commerce. She also served in the 312th Army Band in Lawrence, Kansas before moving to Texas.

Deborah retired after 37 years as a band director in the Pasadena Independent School District where bands under her direction performed and competed successfully at Texas Renaissance Festival, Texas UIL Concert Sight-Reading Contest, Solo and Ensemble Contest and Region Band competitions. The band was selected three times to perform at the state capitol for Arts Education Day and performed the national anthem for twenty-two consecutive years for Houston Astros. Deborah was named "Teacher of the Year" in 2014.

Selected to participate in the Colorado University Conducting

Symposium in June 2016 Ms. Hirsch studied under Steve Davis, Dr. Donald McKinney, Dr. Matt Roeder and Dr. Matthew Dockendorf. In June 2019, she attended the Conn-Selmer Institute where she was able to study, consult and collaborate with many of her band idols- Dr. Tim Lautzenheiser, Dr. Paula A. Crider, Frank Troyka, Michael Sweeney and Richard Saucedo. In the spring of 2019, Deborah was honored to direct the Association of Private Lutheran Schools Honor Band and will conduct the Texas Region 19 Class CC Band this November.

Deborah is an active member of Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, Women Band Directors International and Texas Music Adjudicators Association.

Ms. Hirsch is also a member of the chancel choir and bell choir at Bering Memorial United Methodist Church and a longtime member of Pasadena Little Theater.

native Texan hailing from the Golden Triangle region, David Lea earned his Master of Music Education from the University of North Texas. He earned bachelor's degrees from Texas A&M and State University in Michigan Psychology and Music Education, respectively.

David is entering his fifth year year as a school band director, and his first year as the Director of Bands at Null Middle School in Sheldon ISD. His bands have enjoyed successes at UIL and local and regional festivals. He was honored to support the diverse students at his school by serving as the founding faculty advisor for a student organization focused on inclusion, acceptance, and community.

As a private trumpet teacher, his


students have made Michigan All-state, earned first divisions at regional and state solo & ensemble contest, and had the honor of participating in the Michigan Youth Arts Festival.

David previously played solo cornet in the Capital City Brass Band and 10-piece ensemble, which took first place in their division at the Brass Band US Open. He joined the Houston Pride Band in 2016 and is in his second year as Artistic Director. Formerly serving as section leader, when he's not conducting, he continues to play in the trumpet section.

Program Otes compiled by Chris Foster

Tonight, the Houston Pride Band welcomes you to our annual holiday music extravaganza. This year we are creating a Sugar Plum Fantasy and spotlighting the music of Tchaikovsky's ballet *The Nutcracker* during our first act.

Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (1840-1893) began his adult life as a law clerk in the Russian government. Disillusioned by an "unjust promotion" over his head, he entered the St. Petersburg Conservatory of Music. His compositions reflect the emotional extremes of his

complicated life. He is beloved for his many ballets, symphonic poems, symphonies, operas, songs, piano music, and chamber works.

The Nutcracker (1891) has become the most popular ballet performed at Christmas around the world, appealing to children and adults alike. The ballet opens with Christmas Eve festivities in the home of a little girl, Marie. She receives a wonderful array of toys and presents, including a nutcracker. When the lights are out and guests gone, she steals from bed at midnight to have

another look and a wonderful thing happens: all the playthings come to life. The nutcracker is transformed into a handsome prince, who takes Marie to his magic kingdom.

Tchaikovsky took eight of the musical numbers from the ballet to create *The Nutcracker Suite*. The suite includes the Miniature Overture, the March, the Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy, a Russian dance ('Trepak'), an Arabian dance ('Coffee'), a Chinese dance ('Tea'), the Dance of the Toy Flutes, and finally the Waltz of the Flowers. Tonight, HPB is performing five of the eight movements.

Written to depict the events and stories surrounding the first Christmas, *Adventum* (2013) captures the anticipation, arrival, and celebration of the holidays through the use of sacred and secular carols alike. The piece opens with a quiet setting of "O

Come, O Come Emmanuel," which eventually gives way to an Angel's proclamation to the shepherds. Soon after, all the bells of the world begin to ring on their own accord, building in celebration with the traditional "Ukrainian Bell Carol" before

drawing the piece to an exciting conclusion against a cacophony of ringing bells. *Adventum* composer **Jared Barnes** (b. 1985) is a musician, composer, songwriter, and Music educator teaching band in grades 5-12 in north central Iowa.

The Trans-Siberian Orchestra has been a staple of holiday

music and holiday concerts in the United States since their first tour in 1999. Founded in 1996 by Paul O'Neill (1956-2017) and Robert Kinkel (b. 1957), Trans-Siberian Orchestra combines elements of rock bands and classical music to create holiday rock operas. They

rose to fame based on their first hit

single "Christmas Eve/Sarajevo 12/24". On the same album was *A Mad Russian's Christmas* (1996), based on the Trepak (Russian dance) movement of Tchaikovsky's *The Nutcracker*, which concludes the first act of tonight's concert.

Act two kicks off with Santa's Journey (2009) by Roy W. Kaighin (1951-2016). Kaighin, who had a prolific career as a composer and musician with the Royal Marines Band (UK) and the Royal Canadian Navy Band, wrote this of the piece:

As Santa starts his journey, bringing Joy to the World' by delivering presents to children (and adults too), he sets off on his majestic sleigh driven by his reindeer. A few elves have snuck into the sleigh to help. With a whoosh, he flies across

the sky and over the snowy mountains. The music is in continuous motion, just like Santa's sleigh, as he has many presents to deliver before morning.

The quiet moments in the music depict Santa's arrival in small villages, away from the hustle and bustle of the big cities, touching the hearts of people everywhere. During his journey, Santa discovers the elves who have apparently lost some of the presents. Santa offers a gentle reprimand before the presents are eventually found by Elfie, the youngest elf. After all the presents have been delivered, Santa heads back home as he calls out, "I'll be back next Christmas!"

Gesú Bambino is an Italian-American Christmas carol

composed by Pietro Yon in 1917. The refrain (music and text) are derived from the much older Christmas carol *Adeste Fideles*. The piece is a pastorale, a piece used to signal a scene or episode that takes place out of doors, often including shepherds in idyllic settings. Yon's

(1886-1943) Gesú Bambino includes passages designed to mimic the sounds of pifferari (Italian bagpipes) and serves as an introduction to the angelic announcement of the birth of the infant Jesus to the sleeping shepherds.

Appalachian Snowfall is a musical interlude from Trans-Siberian Orchestra's 1998 second album, The Christmas Attic. The piece evokes the joyful, beautiful effect of snowfall, constantly falling, in the mountains of Appalachia. In the stage performance, this instrumental piece is accompanied by a laser-light show between the songs "Find Out Way Home" and "The Music Box".

"I'll Be Home for Christmas" was recorded in 1943 by Bing Crosby, who scored a top ten hit with the song. The song is sung from the point of view of a soldier stationed overseas during WWII, writing a letter to his family. In the message, he tells the family he will be coming home for the holiday and requests

snow, mistletoe, and presents on the tree. "I'll Be Home for Christmas" has since gone on to become a Christmas standard. The piece was composed by Walter Kent (1911-1994) and lyricist Kim Gannon (1900-1974). Gannon is credited for getting the song published. After

several rejections due to the song's melancholy mood, Gannon pitched the piece directly to Crosby while the two were playing golf and the rest is history.

Christmas in a Nutshell (2019) is a whimsical compilation of Yuletide hymn, secular songs, and themes from Tchaikovsky's *The Nutcracker*. The piece presents them in rapid succession, sometimes overlapping them as they seem at times to fight for the spotlight. You will hear fragments of at least 18 different

songs and *Nutcracker* excerpts. Though the textures are constantly changing, the brisk tempo remains steady throughout. Arranger **Dr**. **Chris Sharp** (b. 1959) is an assistant professor of music at the University of Lynchburg and a former bandleader and composer for the



Walt Disney World Company.

Old Scottish Melody ("Auld Lang Syne") is a song by Robert Burns (1759- 1796). The title, when translated literally into English, means as 'old long since', but translates as 'days gone by'. It is one of the better-known songs in English-speaking countries, and sung at the stroke of midnight on New Year's

Day. Like many other frequently sung songs, the melody is better remembered than the words, which are often sung incorrectly, and seldom in full. This 1976 setting is by Dr. Charles A. "Pete" Wiley (1925-1992) longtime band director at Lamar University in Beaumont.

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
