ARTISTIC DIRECTORS

DEBORAH HIRSCH Artistic Director

Now in her 6th season with the Houston Pride Band, Deborah Hirsch is originally from Baltimore, Maryland. She graduated from the University of Kansas with a bachelor's degree in music therapy and music education and earned a master's degree in music at Texas A&M University-Commerce. She also served in the 312th Army Band in Lawrence, Kansas before moving to Texas.

Retiring after 37 years as a band director in Pasadena, Texas, Deborah enjoyed a successful career in public education. Ms. Hirsch was named "Teacher of the Year" in 2014.

As a participant the Colorado University Conducting Symposium in June 2016 Ms. Hirsch studied under Steve Davis, Dr. Donald McKinney, Dr. Matt Roeder and Dr. Matthew Dockendorf. In June 2019, she attended the Conn-Selmer Institute where she was able to study, consult and collaborate with many of her band idols-Dr. Tim Lautzenheiser, Dr. Paula A. Crider, Frank Troyka, Michael

Sweeney and Richard Saucedo. In the 2019, Deborah was honored to direct the Association of Private Lutheran Schools Honor Band and the Texas Region 19 Class CC Band. In November 2021, she was the guest clinician for the Texas Region 19 CCC Band and shared the podium at the Bigger and Brighter Conference of the Pride Bands Alliance.

Deborah is an active clinician, judge and consultant across the state and is a member of Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, Women Band Directors International and Texas Music Adjudicators Association.

Ms. Hirsch is also a member of the chancel choir and bell choir at Bering Memorial United Church of Christ and a long time member of Pasadena Little Theater.

DAVID LEA Artistic Director

David Lea has been an Artistic Director for the Houston Pride Band since 2018. He joined the ensemble in 2016 and has previously served as trumpet section leader. When he's not conducting, he continues to play in the trumpet section and is a founding member of Brass Tax, an HPB brass quintet.

David earned bachelor's degrees from Texas A&M and Michigan State University in Psychology and Music Education, respectively. He earned his Master of Music Education from the University of North Texas. He has performed and participated in conducting symposiums with Drs. Kevin Sedatole and Craig Kirchoff, Dr. Matthew Westage, Michael Votta and Frank Battisti.

David is currently the Director of Bands at Michael R. Null Middle School in Northeast Houston. His bands have enjoyed successes at UIL Concert & Sight-Reading Evaluations, and local and regional

festivals. As a private trumpet teacher, his students have made Michigan All-state, earned first divisions at regional and state solo & ensemble contests, and had the honor of participating in the Michigan Youth Arts Festival. His professional memberships include Texas Music Educators and Texas Bandmasters Associations. David is an outspoken advocate for his LGBT+ students and was honored to support them by serving as the founding faculty advisor for a student organization focused on inclusion, acceptance, and community.

PROGRAM NOTES

RISE, A GAY GAMES ANTHEM

In 2014, *RISE: A Gay Games Anthem*, was commissioned by the Federation of Gay Games to accompany the raising of the official Gay Games Flag.

Rossano Galante (b. 1967) is an American composer. Galante earned a degree in trumpet performance from the State University of New York at Buffalo in 1992. He then was accepted into the film scoring program at the University of Southern California and studied with film composer Jerry Goldsmith.

Mr. Galante has composed music for the films *Bite Marks*, *The Last Straight Man*, *Monday Morning* and *Channels*. He has served as orchestrator for over sixty studio films including A Quiet Place, *The Mummy*, *Logan*, *Big Fat Liar*, *Scary Movie 2*, *The Tuxedo*, and *Tuesdays With Morrie*, to name only a few. Mr. Galante says of Rise:

"This composition is heroic, uplifting, evocative of achievement, reverent, and welcoming. The work has global appeal, referencing the spirit embodied by the three guiding principles of the Gay Games: Participation, Inclusion, and Personal Best."

ANCIENT FLOWER

An oriental atmosphere is created by the floating melodies of this exotic piece, originally written for orchestra. In the opening, a long, sensitive melodic line emerges, supported by Western-style harmonies. Just as a dainty flower slowly opens, this expressive music blossoms into a work of delicate beauty.

Yukiko Nishimura (b. 1967) is a Japanese composer and pianist. Nishimura graduated from the Tokyo National University of Fine Arts and Music in 1990. One year later, she began graduate study with Alfred Reed at the University of Miami. In 1993 she went to the Manhattan School of Music for further study. She has studied composition with Atsutada Otaka, Dr. Alfred Reed, Dr. Richard Danielpour, and Giampaolo Bracali. She studied piano with Ivan Davis and Dr. Sara Davis Buechner. In 1994 she returned to Japan. Since 1996, she has given concerts consisting entirely of her own music in Japan.

NGOMA ZA KENYA

Paul Basler (b. 1963) is an American composer. Mr. Basler says of Ngoma za Kenya (Jambo):

"Ngoma za Kenya (Jambo) was commissioned by the Florida Chapter of Phi Beta Mu, National Honorary Bandmasters Fraternity. The title of the work is in Kiswahili (the predominant language of East Africa) and translates as "Music of Kenya; Hello." The composition was created from extended sketches I wrote while living in Nairobi, Kenya in 1993– 94 as the Senior Fulbright Lecturer in Music at Kenyatta University. The sketches for "Jambo" were written several weeks after arriving in Nairobi and reflect the immense excitement of being in Africa. This movement reveals a fascination with the sound of open, perfect fifths, parallel chordal motion and the incessant droning of conga drums, a traditional African instrument. Stylistic influences in the work come from my experiences with Kenyan choral traditions (call and response) and the joyful, optimistic and celebratory nature of Kenyans."

A MOTHER OF A REVOLUTION!

Omar Thomas (b. 1984) is an American composer, arranger and educator. Born to Guyanese parents, Omar moved to Boston in 2006 to pursue a Master of Music degree in jazz composition at the New England Conservatory of Music. He is the protégé of Ken Schaphorst and Frank Carlberg, and has studied under Maria Schneider.

Omar's music has been performed in concert halls across the country. He has been commissioned to create works in both jazz and classical styles. His work has been performed by such diverse groups as the Eastman New Jazz Ensemble, the San Francisco and Boston Gay Men's Choruses, and the Colorado Symphony Orchestra.

Mr. Thomas says of A Mother of a Revolution !:

"This piece is a celebration of the bravery of trans women, and in particular Marsha "Pay It No Mind" Johnson. Marsha is credited with being one of the instigators of the famous Stonewall uprising of June 28,1969 -- one of the pivotal events of the LGBTQ liberation movement of the 20th century -- which is commemorated annually during the worldwide Gay Pride celebrations. Existing as a trans woman, especially a trans woman of color, and daring to live authentically, creating space for oneself in a transphobic world, is one of the bravest acts I can imagine. Over 20 trans women were murdered in the United States in 2018 alone. There is no demographic more deserving and, frankly, long overdue for highlighted heroism and bravery. The disco vibe in the latter half of the piece is meant to honor club culture, a sacred space held amongst LGBTQ persons in which to love, live, mourn, heal, strategize, connect, disconnect, and dance in defiance of those outside forces who would seek to do LGBTQ persons harm simply for daring to exist and take up space.

We pump our fists to honor the life, heroism, activism, and bravery of Marsha P. Johnson, to honor the legacy of the Stonewall revolution, to honor the memory of the trans lives violently ended due to fear and hatred, and in honor of trans women worldwide who continue to exist Unapologetically and who demand to be seen.

This piece was commissioned by the Desert Winds Freedom Band, under the direction of Dean McDowell, to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the Stonewall uprising."

ESPAÑA CAÑI

España Cañi has been one of the band world's most popular paso dobles for many years. Known equally well at the bullfight arena and in the concert hall, the mood of the work is set at the opening with staccato rhythm patterns played at a deliberate tempo -- as if from a distance. Unlike the typical military or concert march, the paso doble is often performed at a tempo which may vary from time to time, depending on both the circumstances of the performance and the apparent wishes of the composer. Marquina's varied experiences in the musical and

social life of Spain obviously helped him in the composition of this imaginative and exciting paso doble.

THE SAINTS' HALLELUJAH

Jazz great Luther Henderson created a number of classic settings for the Canadian Brass, and this is one of his best! Skillfully adapted by Michael Brown directly from the quintet version, here is the clever pairing of *When the Saints Go Marching In* with *The Hallelujah Chorus.* This unique and entertaining production number is sure to be a showstopper.

AMAZING GRACE

Frank Ticheli (b. 1958, Monroe) is an American composer and conductor. Mr. Ticheli says of *Amazing Grace*:

"I wanted my setting of *Amazing Grace* to reflect the powerful simplicity of the words and melody -- to be sincere, to be direct, to be honest -- and not through the use of novel harmonies and clever tricks, but by traveling traditional paths in search of truth and authenticity.

I believe that music has the power to take us to a place that words alone cannot. And so my own feelings about *Amazing Grace* reside in this setting itself. The harmony, texture, orchestration, and form are inseparable, intertwined so as to be perceived as a single expressive entity.

The spiritual, *Amazing Grace*, was written by John Newton (1725-1807), a slave ship captain who, after years of transporting slaves across the Atlantic Ocean to the New World, suddenly saw through divine grace the evilness of his acts. First published in 1835 by William Walker in The Southern Harmony, *Amazing Grace* has since grown to become one of the most beloved of all American spirituals.

Amazing Grace was commissioned by John Whitwell in loving memory of his father, John Harvey Whitwell. It was first performed on February 10, 1994, by the Michigan State University Wind Symphony, John Whitwell conductor."

SAMBEANDO (SAMBA DANCING)

Victor López (b. 1950, Cuba) is an American composer, conductor and administrator. Dr. López holds music education degrees from the University of Florida and Florida International University, including a Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) degree in Educational Administration and Supervision. Dr. López says of *Sambeando*:

"Samba is the most widely recognized form of Brazilian music today, and the title of this exciting composition literally translates to "samba dancing," or as some may claim, "partying all the time." Samba is no doubt the best -known form of Brazilian music worldwide and has certainly become an icon of Brazilian national identity. With its roots in Africa, the exciting and intricate rhythms of the samba are contagious, and they take many forms of the various popular rhythm and regional dances that originated from drumming. The samba is important to the Brazilian people because, as an original music genre, it is seen as musical expression of urban Rio de Janiero, the largest city in Brazil.

The love of samba is very much engrained in every "Brasileiro" as they celebrate Samba National Day on December 2nd every year. Additionally, in February, one of the world's largest parties and carnival celebrations is held for five days, and visitors can experience the numerous samba schools that compete annually in the Carnival with thematic floats, elaborate costumes, and original music."

JITTERBUG!

In preparation for composing this piece, Robert studied numerous recordings of the major swing bands of the 1930's and 1940's. His intention was to capture the essence of the jazz age with an original piece of music. Each of the swing bands had their own "signature" sounds, which were immediately recognizable to their flocks of enthusiastic fans. This composition puts these various sounds and rhythms together in homage to a vibrant and innovative time in American music. Jitterbug! was written as a tribute to Dal Richards – Canada's King of Swing – who recently passed away at the age of 99. He fronted his own swing band for almost eighty years. Commissioned by the West Vancouver (BC) Youth Band - Douglas Macaulay, director.

SELECTIONS FROM ENCANTO

Encanto is a 2021 American computer-animated musical fantasy comedy film produced by Walt Disney Animation Studios and distributed by Walt Disney Studios Motion Pictures. *Encanto* follows a multigenerational Colombian family, the Madrigals, led by a matriarch whose children and grandchildren—except for Mirabel Madrigal — receive magical gifts from a miracle that helps them serve the people in their rural community called the Encanto. When Mirabel learns that the family is losing their magic, she sets out to find out what is happening, and save her family and their magical house.

Lin-Manuel Miranda (b. 1980) is an American composer, playwright, actor and singer, best known for creating and starring in the Broadway musicals *Hamilton* and *In the Heights*.

76 TROMBONES

76 Trombones is the signature song from the musical play *The Music Man* (1957), which was written by Meredith Willson. The song also appeared in the 1962 film and in the made-for-TV movie adaptation in 2003. It is also a piece commonly played by marching and military bands.

The arrangement was written by Japanese composer Naohiro Iwai. Most of Iwai's career was spent as a jazz and pop performer and composer. He has made an effort to bring these styles to groups like wind ensembles, brass ensembles, and orchestras that more often play in the Classical style.


The mission of the Houston Pride Band is:


Formerly the Lesbian and Gay Band Association, the Pride Bands Alliance is a membership organization comprised of concert and marching bands from cities across the United States and the world.
