Artist Biographies

Deborah Hirsch

riginally from Baltimore, Marvland, Deborah Hirsch graduated from the University of Kansas with bachelor's degrees in music therapy and music education, and earned a master's degree in music at Texas A&M University-Commerce. She was also a member of the 312th Army Band in Lawrence, Kansas before moving to Texas.

Deborah recently retired after 37 years as a band director in the Pasadena Independent School District, where bands under her direction performed and competed successfully at Texas Renaissance Festival, Texas UIL Concert and Sight Reading Contest, Solo and

Ensemble Contest, and Region Band competitions. The band was selected three times to perform at the state capitol for Arts Education Day and performed the national anthem for twenty-two consecutive years for Houston Astros. Deborah was named "Teacher of the Year" in 2014.

Deborah participated in the Colorado University Conducting Symposium in June, where she studied under Steve Davis, Dr. Donald McKinney, Dr. Matt Roeder, and Dr. Matthew Dockendorf. She is an active member of Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, Women Band Directors International, and Texas Music Adjudicators Association. Deborah is also a member of the chancel choir and bell choir at Bering Memorial United Methodist Church and a board member of Pasadena Little Theater.

David Lea

Artistic Director

Anative Texan hailing from the Golden Triangle region, David Lea earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from Texas A&M University and a bachelor's degree in music education from Michigan State University. He is currently pursuing a master's degree in music education from the University of North Texas.

David is entering his fourth year as a school band director in Pasadena ISD, where his bands have enjoyed successes at UIL and local and regional festivals. He is honored to support the diverse students at his school by serving as the faculty advisor for an LGBTQA+ student organization.

As a private trumpet teacher, his students have made Michigan All-state, earned first divisions at regional and state solo & ensemble contest, and had the honor of participating in the Michigan Youth Arts Festival.

David Lea makes his debut as Artistic Director this season and has been a member of the Houston Pride Band since 2016, formerly serving as trumpet section leader. When he's not conducting, he continues to play in the trumpet section and is a member of BrassTax, a Houston Pride Band brass quintet. He previously played solo cornet in the Capital City Brass Band and 10-piece ensemble, which took first place in their division at the Brass Band US Open.

This evening's program opens with Fantasy on the Huron L Carol. The Huron Carol (or "Twas in the Moon of Wintertime") is a Canadian Christmas hymn (Canada's oldest Christmas song), written in 1643 by Jean de Brébeuf, a Jesuit missionary at Sainte-Marie among the Hurons in Canada. The English lyrics were written in 1926 by Jesse Edgar. The hymn's melody is based on a traditional French folk song, 'Une Jeune Pucelle' (A Young Maid). Using this inherently beautiful

traditional carol as a basis, Robert Buckley has created a symphonic fantasy for the concert stage. The haunting melody is woven through a series of rich and varied stylistic variants. Every section of the band gets a chance to be featured at some point resulting in a sparkling holiday gem.

Inspired by the many works of Gustav Holst, Robert W. Smith created his Holst Winter Suite, which includes three

movements, each of which is inspired by a winter-themed composition by Holst. The suite is dedicated to Ms. Alta Sue Hawkins, a retired Virginia band director and Smith's mother-inlaw, who introduced him to the sacred music works by Holst. The first, "On This Day Earth Shall

Ring", is based on the Piae Cantiones, composed in 1582 and arranged by Holst for chorus in 1924. The second movement, "In the Bleak Midwinter" was composed by Holst in 1908 and is based on a 19th century poem of Christina Rosetti. Finally, Old Brenton Carol is based upon "Come Ye Lofty" which was originally harmonized by Holst in 1910. While the three movements are becoming staples of the concert band holiday repertoire, they are seldom performed together as the full Winter Suite, as composed by Dr. Smith, who is the Director of

the Music Industry program at Troy State University.

In 1933, Russian composter Sergei Prokofiev was asked to write a film score for the Russian film Lieutenant Kijé. Soon after the film's release, Prokofiev received an invitation from the Moscow Radio Symphony Orchestra to create an orchestral suite from his Kijé film music—probably the first instance of a film score being adapted into a significant musical work. The fourth

movement, Troika (a Russian threehorse sleigh), musically invoked a winter sleigh ride by the fictional lieutenant. It was adapted in 1958 by Eddie Sauter and Bill Finegan into a jazz band arrangement called Midnight Sleighride. It was this jazz interpretation that Tom Wallace, noted band music arranger, adapted Eddie Sauter & Bill Finegan for concert band.



In 1944, Alfred Reed composed the large symphonic work

Russian Christmas Music, Based on the liturgical music of the Eastern Orthodox Church, the themes of the suite provide an impression of old Russia during the holiday season. Two of the most famous melodies from Russian Christmas Music are included in the Slavonic Folk Suite, this shorter work for that



Reed created for wind band. First, "Carol of the Little Russian Children" is based on a 16th century Russian carol. Second, the "Cathedral Chorus" is the majestic finale of both works.

The first act of the concert concludes with The Bells of

Christmas. Based on traditional holiday favorites and with a creative mix of styles and treatments, this medley was created for full orchestra by Bob Krogstad and adapted for concert band by Ted Ricketts, the former Music Director at Walt Disney World. The work includes "Ding Dong! Merrily on

High!", "Carol of the Bells", "Silver Bells", "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day", and "Jingle Bells".

The second act kicks off with a joyous medley of contemporary holiday favorites arranged by Robert Sheldon, the Director of Concert Band Publications at Alfred Music Company. Included are holiday favorites "Winter

Wonderland", "I'll Be Home for Christmas", "Santa Claus is Comin' to Town", "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas", and "It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year". We're sure you will enjoy this aptly-titled work A Most Wonderful Christmas.

MacColl, Fairytale of New York was released in 1987 and has remained an enduring and popular holiday favorite ever since. Comprised of two main sections, the opening is melancholy and

lyrical, followed by the second part in a driving and energetic Irish-flavored groove. This arrangement for concert band was created by composer Sean O'Loughlin, who is the Principal Pops conductor for the Victoria Symphony Orchestra in British Columbia.

Written in 1953, Santa Baby was a huge hit for Eartha Kitt, who recorded

three different versions of this song, about a tongue-in-cheek Christmas list for Santa featuring some extravagant gifts. Since then, the song has been recorded by many music stars such

as Madonna, Kylie Minogue, Michael Bublé, Kellie Pickler, Taylor Swift, Gwen Stefani, and Ariana Grande. Our performance of Michael Brown's arrangement for concert band will feature a special guest performance by a close friend of the Houston Pride Band. Brown is currently the Chief Arranger for the United States Army Eartha Kitt Band in Washington, DC.



Composer Richard L. Saucedo created a new take on "Silent

Night" with his piece Carol of the Night. This version is both reverent and creatively arranged, featuring an opening in a minor key which gradually evolves into a more traditional version with some unique harmonic twists. Saucedo is currently the Fine Arts chairman and Director of Bands at Carmel High School in Carmel, Indiana.

In 1956, Walter Schumann asked composer and actor Jester

Hairston to compose a new Christmas song for his Schumann's Hollywood Choir. Hairston retrieved a calypso melody he had created for a friend's birthday party and created Mary's

Boy Child. The song went on to be recorded by Harry Belafonte and Mahalia Jackson (separately) in 1956. The song returned to prominence in 1978 with the popular cover by German disco group Boney M. in 1978. This concert band version was created by British composer Philip Sparke and features the band's lower Philip Sparke woodwind instruments.



As we look toward a new year in 2019, it seems appropriate to include Auld Lang Syne as part of this year's program. Based on a Scots poem written by Robert Burns, it is one of the best-

known melodies in English-speaking countries, the title may be translated into English idiomatically as "long ago" or "old times." This version was arranged by Chip Davis, the genius behind techno group Mannheim Steamroller whose musical mastery and technical wizardry is sometimes described as "18th Century Rock Chip Davis



'n' Roll." Composer and arranger Robert Longfield, Director of the Greater Miami Symphonic Band, adapted the piece for concert band. Audience members should feel free to join the band in singing the lyrics at the climax of the piece:

For auld lang syne, my dear, for auld lang syne, We'll take a cup of kindness yet, for auld lang syne. Auld lang syne.

We close the program with the most popular songs of all time. Written and recorded by Mariah Carey in 1994, All I Want for Christmas is You has gone on to become a staple of the holiday season. It is currently the 11th highest grossing single of Mariah Carey



all time, and is the third holiday song on the list behind Bing Crosby's "White Christmas" (#1) and his "Silent Night" (#3). The Houston Pride Band wishes you all a wonderful holiday season and hope you enjoy this Larry Kerchner arrangement as our gift to you.

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

The Houston Pride Band has a proud history spanning three decades. Originally known as the Montrose Marching Band, the organization was formed by a small group of musicians in 1978 as a way to make new friends and to provide entertainment for Houston's gay and lesbian community.


