ARTISTIC DIRECTOR – JASON STEPHENS

Artistic Director Jason Stephens is a graduate from Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas, where he received a Bachelor's of Music in 2003. He studied Conducting with Travis Almany and Dr. Barry Johnson and has additional conducting instruction from Craig Kirchoff, Director of Bands and Professor of Conducting at the University of Minnesota. After moving to Houston, he joined the Houston Pride Band as a bassoonist in 2005. He was named Interim Artistic Director in early 2006 and

appointed Artistic Director in November 2006.

Mr. Stephens was selected to be a guest conductor with the Oak Lawn Band in Dallas, Texas for their 30th Anniversary concert earlier this month. He has also been chosen to be a guest conductor for the 2010 Gay Games VIII in Cologne, Germany in early August. The Gay Games is the world's largest sporting and cultural event organized by and specifically for LGBT athletes, artists, musicians and others.

Mr. Stephens currently works for the Houston Public Library as a Special Projects Coordinator and plans to pursue his Masters in Library Sciences from the University of North Texas. He is the music librarian for the River Oaks Chamber Orchestra, a professional chamber orchestra in Houston, Texas. In addition, Mr. Stephens is the music librarian and 2nd bassoonist for the Houston Civic Symphony, Houston's first and finest community orchestra.



SAXWORX

SaxWorx has been peforming together since 2005.

Originally organized to perform at Houston Pride Band concerts, the group quartet is

branching to perform at other events in the community. Recent performances include the Gay and Lesbian Community Center's National Coming Out Day celebration, the Hobby Center's Volunteer Appreciation Night, and the American Cancer Society's Relay For Life of Montrose.



PAM STEPHENS

Pam Stephens has been playing piano since age seven. She majored in organ performance as an undergraduate at California State University, Chico, and took a Masters in Music, with emphasisis on early music, at Stanford University. She is also a "lapsed" doctoral candidate in World Music at UC Santa Barbara, and hopes to finish someday. Pam is a church organist, and currently substitutes at various churches in

Houston. She has also accompanied and directed choirs, instrumentalists and vocalists, and has worked as a freelance musician in California, Ohio and Houston. Pam enjoys working with a MIDI synthesizer and computer sequencing software to compose short compositions, which have been used for radio commercials and corporate websites. Currently, Pam also teaches music in the Houston and Spring areas.

Amazing Grace Skip Martin

The spiritual "Amazing Grace" was written by John Newton, a slaveship captain who, after ears of transporting slaves across the Atlantic Ocean to the New World, suddenly saw through divine grace the evilness of his acts. This arrangement was written by the Houston Pride Band's own Skip Martin in 2006 for a student teacher at Cy-Fair high school who was killed in a car wreck. It is performed tonight to support the effort of the Trevor Project to create a future

where the possibilities, opportunities and dreams are the same for all youth, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity.

The Beatles: Love

Paul McCartney and John Lennon (arr. Jay Bocook)

You would be hard pressed to find someone who hasn't heard of The Beatles. The English rock band form in the 60's has been one of the most commercially successful and critically acclaimed acts in the history of popular music. The group consisted of John Lennon, Paul McCartney, George Harrison and Ringo Starr. Rooted in 1950's rock and roll, the group later worked in many genres ranging from pop ballads to psychedelic rock, often incorporating classical and

other elements in innovative ways.

Created by famed Beatles producer George Martin along with his son Giles for the ambitious Cirque du Soleil Las Vegas show spectacular, the album "Love" utilizes original Beatles recordings recast in new and imaginative settings and mixes. Effectively adapted for the concert stage by Jay Bocook, this terrific medley features "Because", "Drive My Car", "The Word", "What You're Doing", "Hey Jude" and "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band."





The Clock and the Dresden Figures Albert Ketèlbey (arr. David E. Smith)

Albert Ketèlbey displayed a talent for music at a young age, and by his teens was composing classical pieces. He attended Trinity College of Music in Oxford, beating out Gustav Holst in a scholarship competition. Although he achieved some critical recognition for his choral and chamber works, his greatest success was in descriptive pieces with exotic subjects. His *In a Persian Market, In a Chinese Temple Garden,* and *In a Monastery Garden* were

very popular with theater orchestras and in sheet music form. Although this type of music is now out of style, it was well considered at the time-Ketelbey was in some ways the last of a line that included Johann Strauss and Franz Lehar.

The Clock and the Dresden Figures is another of these descriptive pieces originally written for piano and orchestra. The piece tells of two Dresden-China Figures, standing on each side of a Clock, coming to life and dancing to the ticking of the Clock; after a while the Clock goes wrong, the spring breaks suddenly and the two figure rush back to their former positions.



Colonel Bogey March Kenneth J. Alford

Kenneth J. Alford was a pseudonym for Frederick Joseph Ricketts. Born the son of a coal merchant in London, he studied both piano and organ as a child and by the age of fourteen was playing cornet in the Royal Irish Regiment Band. He completed the bandmaster's course at the Royal Military School of Music at Kneller Hall in 1908. Most of his marches were composed during the next two decades while he was bandmaster of the Second Battalion Argyll and

Sutherland Highlanders. Alford is best remembered for his restrained and dignified "poetic" marches. He was as famous in England for his marches as Sousa was in the United States.

With the *Colonel Bogey March*, the interval of a descending minor third evokes a common sense of recognition and is probably important to the innate appeal of this march. Playing golf in Scotland in 1913, Alford heard the two-note interval whistled as a warning. It became the basis of this march, with the familiar golf term "bogey" in the title. Bawdy lyrics were added by World War I British troops, much to Alford's chagrin. The march was later featured in the film *The Bridge on the River Kwai*.

Ralph Vaughan Williams, one of the most eminent of contemporary English composers, is known throughout the world for his splendid choral and orchestral works. Like many modern English composers, he found great inspiration in the study of folk music and in the work of early English masters such as Henry Purcell. He made his own the modal harmonies and striking rhythms found in the traditional folks songs of Norfolk and Somerset, but formed an entirely individual style out of these elements.

Flourish for Wind Band Ralph Vaughan Williams

This short work was written in 1939 for military band and was an overture to the pageant *Music and the People* in the Royal Albert Hall. However, the score was lost after the first performance only to reappear in 1971. Because of this, it was not made available to American bands until it was published in 1972. This work, a *flourish*, has the character of a fanfare with a legato middle section.

Folk Song Suite

Ralph Vaughan Williams

Composed for military band in 1924, this suite of music is recognized as one of the masterpieces of the concert band repertoire. Vaughan Williams' interest in the wind band has nowhere found more satisfactory expression than in this suite; the score is remarkable for its originality and masterful instrumentation. Based entirely on folk music sources, the suite is written in three movements: March - Seventeen Come Sunday, Intermezzo - My Bonny Boy, and March - Folk Songs from Somerset

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


Symphonic Suite from Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire Patrick Doyle (arr. Robert Sheldon)

J.K. Rowling's Harry Potter series has become one of the best selling series of novels of all time as well as the best selling movie series of all time as well. The story involves an orphan named Harry Potter who discovers at the age of eleven that he is a wizard and is invited to attend the boarding school called Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry. The Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire is the story of Harry's fourth year in school where an inter-school

wizarding competition takes place at Hogwarts. Despite being too young to participate, Harry suddenly finds himself thrown into the competition, battling dragons, conspiracy and the evil Lord Voldemort.

Scottish film composer Patrick Doyle is known for his collaborations with Kenneth Branagh and the Shakespearean community. He has composed music for many of Branagh's productions (including Henry V, Dead Again, Much Ado About Nothing, Mary Shelley's Frankenstein and Hamlet) as well as other notable movies such as Carlito's Way, Sense and Sensibility and Bridget Jones' Diary. This symphonic suite evokes the majestic and excitement of Harry's fourth year, featuring the hauntingly beautiful "Harry in Winter", the exciting battle between the Irish and Bulgarian Quidditch teams in "The Quidditch World Cup", the noble and expressive "Hogwarts' Hymn", "Hogwarts' March" which evokes the tradition of brass bands in Great Britain, and dark and menacing return of He Who Shall Not Be Named in "Voldemort!"
